Amazingly, she turns out (*see left*) to be an absolute dreamboat.

There's only one problem with their affair: the fact that no radio technician has ever managed to convey two people enjoying a passionate kiss by sound alone. The true sound of a real-life snog is dead silence, but that would never do. So Brian and Siobhan have to punctuate their embraces with gasps and little kissy noises that are inappropriate.
